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Dear Parishioners...

The sun is here, and the parish is in full bloom, looking at its most beautiful! The hedgerows have been looking particularly spectacular with their wildflowers and diverse flora. With the first Visite du Branchage scheduled for Thursday 29th June and the second on Thursday 7th September, spare a thought for the wildlife that live or are supported by the hedges and banques. Check for nests and hedgehogs before you start any work.

Think about what is needed - a light cut to remove overhanging vegetation will often suffice and mean less disturbance to wildlife and also help stabilise the banques and reduce erosion. See more branchage tips alongside the article on the National Trust's Green Grid Planting programme in the parish.

Although the weather was not quite so generous throughout early Spring, the clouds didn't stop parishioners coming out in force to celebrate the Coronation of King Charles III. This edition of L'Étaile du Nord shows the breadth of festivities, from the school's royal picnic to the fantastic Family Fun Day at the Rec – a joyous sell-out event.

History is important, whether looking back at royal events or something more local, as it defines where we have come from and connects our forebears and our environment to ourselves. 


The day's entertainment was topped off by a fantastic performance by local band Inside Job, who filled the dance floor and kept the party going long enough for the sun to come out!

Chiming for Charles

You may have heard the St John's Church bells ringing joyously to celebrate the coronation of King Charles III on Saturday 6th May. In the morning, parishioners were invited to have a go to 'Ring for the King'. This was followed by a special quarter peal in the afternoon by the church bellringers to mark the coronation.

One local man who participated in ringing the bells for King Charles III is no stranger to tolling for royal occasions. Robin Pittman began ringing bells in Essex at aged 14 when a verger of his church suggested that he and two other friends give it a try. He quickly became a keen bell ringer and two years later, in 1952, he participated in his first full peal, three hours halfmuffled, to mark the death of King George VI.

A year later he joined in another full peal, this time to celebrate the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II. He continued to bell ring throughout his youth and university days, stopping when he took up his first post as a history teacher. Mr Pittman worked as a teacher and then a Headteacher, for 31 years, and on his retirement, he took up bell ringing again, this time at St John's Church which is one of only two churches in the island with a ringable bell tower (St Mark's is the other).

Now, 70 years after ringing for the Queen's coronation, Mr Pittman rang for the coronation of her son, Charles III. "It's just like riding a bike, you don't forget how to ring the bells!" he enthused.

School Playing Field

If you have driven along Rue de La Mare Ballam you will see the great progress being made with the new development of affordable homes.

My predecessor Chris Taylor worked hard to get the scheme passed for 16 affordable homes and a playing field for the school, and with over 200 names on our list there is clear demand.

The allocation of the homes is still to be done due to several delays. One of these was due to the amount of money Property Holdings wanted for connecting the drains. After many months of wrangling, I was pleased to get the support of the Infrastructure Minister, Tom Binet. As a result, we significantly reduced the cost resulting in a £7,500 difference per household; this could be the difference between someone being able to afford a home, so it was worth pursuing.



As part of the planning process, several conditions are attached to the development. For example, anyone successful in being nominated by the parish, will have to meet the affordable housing gateway criteria. Details of the criteria are available on the *gov.je* website.

We look forward to families moving in over the summer and their integration into the village community and parish life.

Playing Field

Part of the agreement for the development of Field 525 was for the provision of the long-awaited playing field for the school.

At last year's Rates Assembly, the meeting approved that the parish receive the land from the developer and then enter into a long-term lease with the school. This is scheduled to go through court on completion of the works.

Revised plans are currently going through the process, and these include a playing field as well as a running track. The plan is for the playing field area to be in the centre with a path around the perimeter. The provision of allotments and growing area is included, as well as areas with potential for outdoor learning.

Footpath

The new development will have a public footpath and cycle path running through to Rue des Buttes from Rue de La Mare Ballam. The existing footpath from Clos de L'École will be diverted to join the new path and the current wooden fence will be removed to enable the playground to be extended to the south.

At St John's Primary School, we celebrated the Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III on Monday 5th May.

We were part of the "Crowning Glory" island-wide initiative and each class created crowns to coronate a king in their classrooms. Some crowns were decorated with natural resources foraged from the local environment whilst others built their crowns from old newspapers taking the importance of the structure into account. The products created were incredible and were testament to the creativity and eye for detail of our cohort of children.

Two of our classes participated in a special workshop using a fine selection of classical music inspired by the coronation. It was presented by leading musicians from the Jersey Chamber Orchestra including members of the BBC Symphony Orchestra. The learning experience focused on how the composer uses music creatively to portray culture.

For major royal occasions, the standout part of any celebration must be the street party, the English celebratory picnic lunch. So, at St John's we did it in style with our fabulous PTA preparing a very impressive spread for all our children. A massive thanks must go to Mrs Kerry McBrearty and her PTA team for another wonderfully organised event that was delivered seamlessly.

With all that we do at St John's we reflect upon our School Values: Thinking, Learning, Caring. Our children showed their capacity to think when considering the importance of the date in history and the time that had elapsed since the last coronation of a British monarch.

Our children showed their desire to learn, as we discussed the

timeline of the British monarchy and the "passage of power" that they may well experience in their own lifetimes.

Our children showed their caring nature, as they always do, in the manner that they enjoyed the day together, the respect they showed one another and the encouragement they offered their peers.



The St JUFF's walk (St. John's Unite for Funds) has been an annual event at school for several years now with all classes completing some part of the walk. There are four cleverly designed loops that took us across numerous lanes in the Parish that I never knew existed! All children participated in the event and were all very proud of their achievements.

Sponsor monies are still rolling in, so we have no final total to share just yet.



However, we plan to use the funds raised to purchase new literature to add to our redesigned and redeveloped reading area in the main piazza in our school.

Thank you to Francois and his team of Honorary Police Officers for keeping us safe when crossing roads and crossing junctions. Thank you to Mrs Surcouf for supporting the organisation of the event, and finally thanks to all members of the School Community and Parish that came out to offer well wishes as we plodded around the parish. Your words of encouragement helped the children to find the perseverance to complete the challenge.

Working to Build a Greener and Inclusive Jersey

It's been a year since I was elected for the first time to represent Trinity, St Lawrence, and St John. At times it has been tinged with tragedy and loss, which has developed my deeper understanding and greater respect for the emergency services, Honorary Police, and all those that support our community in the time of greatest need.

Highlights have been my interaction with the parishes, from holding a Parish Surgery nearly once a month, special events for Liberation Day and Remembrance Sunday, supporting individual parishioners with their concerns and hopefully managing to solve a few issues, to going to schools to talk about my role as a States Member and my responsibilities around Energy and Climate Change. I was delighted to be invited by a pupil to visit St John's School Student Council, to discuss with them what the school and the students could do to make a positive impact on our environment. Some great ideas came out of our discussion and I look forward to seeing these being actioned.

After a year of States Assemblies, I am getting used to the format (and the discomfort of the chairs!). It is a very daunting experience as a newcomer to work out how and when to input in the debate, how to formulate what you want to say and ultimately which way to vote. I brought my first proposition, proposing an independent Climate Council, that was unanimously agreed by my fellow States Members, which will form part of the important accountability process for the Carbon Neutral Roadmap.

My work as Assistant Minister for both Environment, where I am responsible for energy and climate change, and Home Affairs, where I am responsible for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, is extremely busy. So far, I have launched incentive schemes for e-bikes, low-carbon heating and energy efficiency improvements, supporting Green Skills development, promoting sustainable transport use, and meeting stakeholders and experts to make sure we develop a secure, affordable and sustainable future energy policy. Home Affairs was a new area for me and I have enjoyed building my knowledge rapidly, focusing especially on building an action plan for diversity and inclusion and policy that focuses on early prevention and community safety.

My manifesto called for 'a green and inclusive Jersey' – my main roles that I have been appointed to in Government speak to these two areas and I am working hard to make sure we can show progress.

I hope to meet many more Parishioners. The next surgery will be on Wednesday 5th July from 6pm-7.30pm at the St Lawrence Parish Hall with Andy Howell and Elaine Miller. Pollinator Patches and a Community Herb Garden

On Monday 8th May 2023, in recognition of the Big Help Out initiative, members of the St John Climate Group got together to plant the first pollinator patches between the trees along Rue des Issues and Ville des Chenes. We also started the planting of a variety of herbs such as marjoram and oregano in the village where, in time, we hope to create a community herb garden that all can use and enjoy. These projects intend to be beneficial to both the community and the environment.

If any residents would like to donate any herbs to be included in the community herb garden, these would be gratefully received and can be dropped off at the Parish Hall. We are looking for any herbs such as sage, rosemary, thyme and lavender etc.

We plan to plant further pollinator patches at Haute Croix Triangle, behind the bus stop in the village, at the cemetery, around the church and by the bus stop in Sion village.

Pollinator patches offer numerous benefits to the environment, animals, and the community.

Pollination: they provide a vital habitat for bees, butterflies, birds and other pollinators. These creatures play a crucial role in pollinating flowering plants, including crops, which promote healthy ecosystems and contribute to food production.

Biodiversity: they support biodiversity by attracting a wide range of pollinator species. Diverse pollinators contribute to the overall health and resilience of ecosystems. Additionally, these habitats often include a variety of flowering plants, which further enhances biodiversity by providing food and shelter for other wildlife species.

Habitat preservation: many pollinator species face habitat loss due to urbanisation, agriculture, and other human activities. These patches provide a refuge and stepping-stones for pollinators, aiding their survival and maintaining healthy populations.

Educational opportunities: educational programmes centred around pollinator patches can raise awareness about conservation, biodiversity, and sustainable practices and provide handson learning experiences for children and adults, allowing them to observe and understand the importance of pollinators in ecosystems and food production.

Aesthetics and well-being: they enhance the visual appeal of neighbourhoods and public spaces, creating a welcoming environment. Spending time in these natural settings can have positive effects on mental well-being and foster a sense of community connection with nature.



Saluting His Majesty

St John resident and long-time gunner with the 1781 Jersey Militia, Francois Le Luyer, participated in the recent 21-gun salute at Government House to mark His Majesty, the King's Birthday reception.

The traditional event was extra special this year as it marked both the birthday of the new monarch, King Charles III and was the first to be hosted by the new Lieutenant Governor, Vice Admiral Jeremy Kyd CBE and his wife, Dr Karen Kyd.

Francois is the owner of two canons and is often joined by his son, Fabian, on ceremonial occasions.

Another St John resident and stalwart of the Jersey Militia, David Wood, was unable to attend as he was in France visiting the First World War cemetery at the Menin Gate where he laid a wreath dedicated to The Fallen.

Adolf Hitler's directive to fortify the Channel Islands presented a number of problems for the local German authorities.

Not only would they have to feed, equip, and house a German division on a tiny group of islands but also, they would need to construct suitable defences.

Responsibility for building the Channel Island fortifications fell to Organisation Todt (OT), a military engineering firm attached to the German state. It was quickly decided that the local workforce

was not large enough to meet this demand. It was therefore decided that a significant proportion of the labour would be undertaken by forced, or slave labourers, from all corners of occupied Europe. This presented its own issues, namely, where to house these labourers when the islands' housing infrastructure was already at breaking point.

This problem would be solved up the erection of makeshift camps, which were uniformly placed as close to the building sites as possible and run by OT camp guards. The re-opening of Ronez Quarry in early 1942

meant that a labour camp needed to be constructed in St John, to house the forced labourers working at the quarry. This camp would be centred around the St John's Hotel (now the St John's Inn). The building had started life as a manor house in the 1870s but had been utilised as a hotel from the early 1900s. The hotel was being run by Mrs Eliza Salou by the time of the German invasion and she was evicted from the premises not long after this. A barbed wire perimeter was erected around the building and three additional wooden huts were built adjacent to the hotel. The camp became known as 'Lager Prien' after Leutnant Gunther Prien, a German U-boat commander who had sunk the H.M.S. Royal Oak.

The first residents of the camp were Spanish labourers; refugees who had settled in France after Franco's victory in the Spanish Civil War. These exiles were then handed over to the Germans by the collaborationist Vichy government in exchange for French POWs. Considered as 'communists' by the German state, they were set to work as manual labourers constructing submarine pens in the South of France before making their way to Jersey from December 1941. These Spaniards came from all sectors of society

(doctors, clerks, shopkeepers, etc.) and most were poorly suited to the gruelling work of quarrying. They were quickly replaced by slave labourers from the Soviet Union, who started arriving in the island by mid-1942. In the eyes of their German captors, these labourers were collectively referred to as 'Russians' yet the majority of these labourers were Ukrainian.


The Soviets were at the bottom of the racial hierarchy in the eyes of OT and were usually assigned the most difficult and dangerous construction jobs. The Soviets were poorly fed, forced to work elevenhour shifts for six days a week and were given substandard equipment. Beatings and maltreatment of Soviet workers by the OT guards were also common. Given this, it is no surprise that the death rate amongst the Soviet workers far outpaced those of the Spanish or French labourers. Seventy-three Soviet workers were buried at Stranger's Cemetery at Westmount over the course of the Occupation, compared with only nine Spaniards.

Conditions within the camps were so horrendous that some of its occupants regularly escaped to steal food from neighbouring farms and houses. This inevitably brought them into contact with the locals and some farmers were assaulted and killed by these marauding Soviets. Lager Prien had its fair share of runaways, to the point where the Connétable of St. Mary complained to the Bailiff that a "considerable number of Russians" had escaped from the camp and were terrorising the parish.

By 1943, the problem could no longer be ignored by the German authorities. The Feldgendarmarie (German military police) teamed up with the States Police and the honorary police to do regular patrols of the rural parishes in hopes of capturing these vagabonds. On the 10th of September 1943, three escaped Soviets were apprehended near St John's Church.

Lager Prien closed shortly after the guarry at Ronez ceased operations in early 1944, with the camp residents being swiftly transported back to Europe. Before they left, three interns of the camp attended a church service at St John's Church on Christmas Eve 1943. The lager was left abandoned for the rest of the Occupation and its wooden huts were probably dismantled for firewood during the harsh winter of 1944/45. Like many of the OT camps in Jersey, very little evidence remains today of the actual camp. The original building resumed as a hotel after the German surrender in 1945 until it was demolished in the 1970s and replaced by the St John's Inn.

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

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Smoking Deliciousness

They say there's no smoke without fire and a bit of smoke has definitely fired up one family in St John. Tucked away in the country lanes of the parish at Farm View, The Smokey Shed and the Jersey Little Biltong Company are run by the entrepreneurial Cotillard family, making biltong, dry wors (a spicy sausage), beef jerky and smoked salmon.

They've been producing smoked salmon for 10 years now, having started literally in their garden shed. Business owner Neil Cotillard explains, "I love food and I love smoked salmon. I first tried out making beef jerky, which is hot smoking, on a BBQ we built. I had a 'how to smoke on your BBQ' book and there was a recipe for cold smoked salmon, and I thought I'd give it a go. The first time we tried was absolutely awful; I over-smoked it, used the wrong wood and it was so bitter. So, I read up more and tried again and second time it was amazing. We used to do four or five sides of salmon at a time and split it out amongst the family. Then guests at dinner parties would ask for some and from there it just escalated."

The business grew under the name of The Smokey Shed, mostly through word of mouth and Facebook to begin with. Now, they smoke salmon every week, taking pre-orders for collection. They use farmed salmon from Scotland and oak wood chip imported from Wales. A whole side will feed a dinner party of 15, but you can order a half side or a quarter side as well.

So, what's special about this smoked salmon? "The commercial smoked salmon you buy in the shops has a shelf life of six weeks because it's heavily salted.

it, it's really nice and soft." And according to feedback from their customers it's the best smoked salmon they've ever tasted.

Following the success of The Smokey
Shed, the family have branched out,
buying the Little Jersey Biltong Company
from founder Mark Pinnick
earlier this year. The company
already has a large following in
the island. Made entirely from
Jersey beef, it's a Genuine Jersey
product, using only the best
cuts of topside and silverside
Jersey beef which are marinated
in a mouth-watering concoction
and then seasoned with a
delicious blend of herbs and
spices before drying, to make a

tasty snack.



HESMOKEYSHED

The two businesses are very much a family affair with Neil's children Lily, 15, Ella, 12 and George, 10 all helping. "Quite a lot of this is about teaching the kids business and we discussed it with them before buying the Biltong company. They help with the Facebook posts, my wife Rebecca does the accounts on Quickbooks and shows them how to do it, what's profit, what's gross, what's net, things they don't get taught at school. They also learn about food hygiene, the law, paying tax. We're teaching them all these life skills," Neil explains.

St fohn's Village Proposed Plans for Memorial Garden

I am delighted to include in this edition the latest drawings for the proposed Memorial Garden.

Following the rejection of plans in 2021, we have taken the opportunity to reflect and review what we do with the land opposite the Parish Hall.

During the Bridging Island Plan debate in 2022, I took a successful amendment that rezoned the land for community use. We would hope that any plans that we take forward after a period of consultation, will find a smoother path forward and we can finally create a space for community use for all ages.

We continue to have dialogue with Infrastructure about taking over the land to the west of the Church (subject to approval at a Parish Assembly). We would like to tidy up this area and return the views of the Church from the west. We have now had an opportunity to look at the potential to move some of the trees and shrubs into the new space, creating some mature planting in the new area (see images 1&2).

St John Primary School is the only school that has cars parked in an active playground, this is not sustainable with valuable play space used by cars and the new plans would create parking outside of the playground.

The proposal has evolved to include a labyrinth and we are also keen to see natural materials used for play in the area. The inclusion of a shelter for the Pétanque pitch has also been suggested (see images 3&4).

We would like to hear your views – *please see the questionnaire on page 26.*

There is an opportunity to complete the questionnaire and provide comments on the proposals. I would encourage as many Parishioners as possible to give us feedback on these plans and this will be open until 28th of July.

The Green Grid Partnership

St John joins in with the fun of The Hedge Fund

As part of its hedge project, the National Trust for Jersey has planted an additional 11,000 hedging whips to the 30 plus miles of hedgerow established to date. This is the fourth consecutive year and the first with the support of the three utility companies; namely Jersey Electricity, JT Global and Jersey Water, forming a partnership entitled the #Green Grid.

In St John and St Mary, the Trust has planted 10,831 hedging whips this winter, covering an area of 8,125 metres. Maintenance will be carried out in the summer months and for at least the next two years, with the assistance of our Green Grid Partners. It is anticipated that planting in St John will continue next year in order to complete our target of connecting the wooded areas of Le Mourier Valley to the west with the existing, mature, woodland at Bonne Nuit and La Vallette in the east.

This additional five miles of habitat will be of great benefit to insects, invertebrates, mammals and birds. The extra flowers produced in the spring by the hawthorn, blackthorn and crab apple will boost the food source for pollinators. The fruit that is subsequently produced in the autumn will provide an abundant food source for birds and wasps, the latter possibly not being everyone's favourite insect, however, since there are less bees in existence, wasps now play an important role in pollinating flowers as well as predating on other troublesome insects such as aphids and caterpillars. As new hedges are planted or gaps in existing hedgerows filled, the 'green grid' will grow and spread in areas that are lacking in trees and hedgerows.

The Green Grid partners have pledged to support the project both financially as well as providing valuable assistance from their staff and this winter they planted over 1,750 hedging whips covering a distance of 1.35km between St John's village and the porth coast



The Trust is very grateful to the Government and the Environment Department in particular for its support via the Countryside Enhancement Scheme to date and also to The Jersey Royal Company



for its assistance in putting landowners in touch with the Trust.

If any St John parishioners can spare a few hours during the week or on a Saturday, there are opportunities to get involved in the hedge maintenance programme. This involves cutting back vegetation by hand to prevent the hedging whips being smothered as they grow.

BEST BRANCHAGE PRACTICE

- DO use your skill to raise the flail head enough to avoid exposing bare soil.
- **DO** try to remove all cuttings, do not allow them to cover the banque or fall into the road.
- **DO** check for the presence of wildlife in the vegetation, hedges and trees.
- **DO** contact the JSPCA if you find an injured animal (724331).
- **DO** cut with hand tools wherever possible.
- DON'T cut the vegetation around the base of trees, shrubs or hedges.
- DON'T destroy nests, or roosts, or injure nesting birds, bats, hedgehogs or other wildlife.
- **DON'T** cut so severely that bare soil is exposed.
- DON'T cut lower than 10cm.
- DON'T use herbicides for routine branchage practice.



Billy Butlin Memorial Hall 40th Anniversary

In March, the St John's Recreation Centre celebrated 40 years since the opening of the Billy Butlin Memorial Hall. We take a look back at four decades of changes.

Whilst it is 40 years since the late Duke of Edinburgh opened the Billy Butlin Memorial Hall in 1983, the funding of the land purchase for St John Football Club by the late Sir Billy Butlin and the initial phase of the building actually took place three years earlier in 1980. The illustrious history of the St John Football Club goes back even further as it was founded in 1919!

The Butlin family have continued to be very supportive and generous with their support of the Centre over the years.

Whilst the building was further developed in the years following the opening of the Hall, and the Centre initially flourished, unfortunately its fortunes declined for a number of years. Nevertheless, the Centre still had a lot of support in the parish and a new chapter commenced in 2005 when a new management team was recruited, and a turnaround strategy was devised.

Our vision was to create a modern, multi-purpose and flexible facility for the community, underpinned by a sustainable and diversified revenue base.

The day-to-day management of the Centre became the responsibility of St John Centre Ltd, a registered charity. The directors of the company are all honorary roles.

St John Centre Ltd was granted a long-term lease by the Trustees which was essential in order that we could plan for the future and embark on a fund-raising campaign in order to make a substantial capital investment in the building.

We were fortunate to secure funding of £0.5m from two Butlin family trusts. We subsequently also secured more than £0.5m from a wide range of other sources including parishioners, companies, and charities.

The timeline provides a flavour of all the developments which have taken place over the years, including the flat for our caretaker, a café, the strength and conditioning clinic, the yoga room, the skateboard park and creating an additional 28 car parking spaces.

The Centre's usage levels are now at an all-time high and the article in the Spring 2023 issue of the Star covered the wide spectrum of activities which are as varied as archery, activity clubs and aerial gymnastics (and that it just our users beginning with an 'a'!). This in turn has resulted in good profits being generated which are either re-invested in the building or set aside for future capital projects.

The turnaround has been a team effort and would not have been possible without the support of the wider community.

The management team looks forward to the next 40 years with confidence!

2014 Phase 2 of St John Youth Project development is completed consisting of a two-storey extension with a glass fronted mezzanine recreational area and a doubling of their floor space. New changing rooms, toilets and showers for the St John Football Club are also completed.

March 2023 40th anniversary of the opening of the Billy Butlin Memorial Hall

Temps Passé: SION



If you grew up in Sion in the 1960s, 1970s or 1980s, there was a good chance that you attended the Youth Club at Sion Chapel. For many young people in the southerly tip of the parish, the club formed the beating heart of their social lives.

Sion Youth Club was part of the Methodist Association of youth clubs, although you didn't need to be a Methodist to join. Richard Dupre joined at aged 11, "As soon as I was old enough, I joined the club! Initially it was run by John and Diana Mauger, who were the

> caretakers at the church, but they left to emigrate to Australia and their places as leaders were taken over by Don and Dulcie De La Haye. Under their guidance the club really flourished."

Activities at the club were wide ranging. Besides regular games, members took part in table tennis, swimming evenings down at Bonne Nuit, camping at weekends, and a variety of competitions against other youth clubs. They made two floats for the Battle of Flowers and did a few shows on the stage in the hall, in which most of the members took part.

The club saw particular success in the early 1960s with their 5-a-side football team, made up of David Dallain, Richard Blampied, Peter Williams, Ken Corbin and Derrick Frigot,

with Don de la Haye as Coach. The team beat their biggest rivals Aguila Road Youth Club to become island champions. They then beat Guernsey's Les Capelles club, the biggest in the Channel Islands, gaining the team a spot in the All-England finals in London where they were eventually knocked out by the cup winners. Not bad for a small club from St John!









TH CLUB



"The club was a really happy time for us all," Richard recalls. "A few of us started a band called The Siontists and we played quite often at the Rainbow Room ballroom! We also spent months digging out under the church to make a club room and a rifle range."

The youth club had a hiatus when Don and Dulcie De La Haye retired but re-formed in the 1970s under the care of Reverend Colin Hayes and his wife Anne, who ran the club with various parents taking it in turns to supervise every Friday night.

Tracy Baudains lived in the village at that time and loved having a youth club on her doorstep. Happily, the football success from the 1960s was replicated, this time by an all-girls side. "Girls from the club entered a 5-a-side indoor football competition in April 1981 and we won the open girls final at Fort Regent! The boys coached us," Tracy recalls. She also remembers a group entering a disco dancing competition getting through to the finals held at Aquila Road in March 1980 and coming a respectable third.

Another past club member, Deborah Robinson (née Shaw) also has fond memories, "I remember playing badminton in the hall and carol singing around the lanes. We had posters of all the Pin Ups of the day in the small room at the back where it was darker and we played music."

"It kept us out of town, and we made lifelong friends," Tracy said. "Not to mention three marriages occurred as a result!"

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
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CHANGES TO GST FROM 1 JULY 2023

There are some important changes if you shop online. These changes also include magazine and brochure sales.

OVERSEAS RETAILERS WILL CHARGE GST AT THE POINT OF PURCHASE.

From 1 July 2023 if you buy online or from a magazine or brochure, you will see 5% Jersey GST being charged at the point of purchase by a number of retailers that sell to Jersey customers. This will apply to all goods, including low value items.

THE GST DE MINIMIS IS BEING REDUCED.

The de minimis remains as an administrative measure for goods that have had no GST charged at the point of purchase, but it is reducing from £135 to £60.

If you buy goods from an overseas retailer that doesn't charge GST at the point of purchase, you will still need to pay GST to Customs before they are delivered, unless the de minimis amount applies.

WHY IS THIS CHANGING?

We need to create a level playing field, as domestic retailers have always had to charge GST on all goods.

The only reason there is a 'low value' threshold for online goods is purely for logistical reasons.

Since 2021 the European Union and the UK have required all goods that go across boundaries to be charged at the VAT/GST rate of the receiving Member State. Jersey has always planned to quickly follow those changes.

This has meant that we have been able to update our law, requiring that the overseas retailers who sell the most to Jersey customers, register for GST in Jersey.

We can now ensure that GST is charged at the point of purchase, removing the logistical burden from Customs and the shippers in most cases.

We expect that a high number of goods arriving in Jersey after 1 July will have GST added at the point of purchase.

GOODS BOUGHT BEFORE 1 JULY 2023

If you buy goods that cost more than £60 from an overseas retailer and it does not have GST paid, you will still have to pay GST through Customs if the goods arrive after the 30 June 2023.

GST REFUNDS

If you return any items and you were charged GST at the point of purchase, the overseas retailer will deal with your refund claim (or give credit), including the GST charged. You will no longer have to apply to Customs for a refund of the GST.

You will still need to apply to Customs for a GST refund on any returned goods where GST was charged at the point of import.

WHAT IS THE GST DE MINIMIS LEVEL?

The GST de minimis is only in place for administrative reasons. When GST was first introduced overseas retailers didn't add Jersey GST at point of purchase, so GST had to be paid at the point of importation.

The GST threshold is an administrative solution reflecting the costs of collecting relatively small amounts of GST for non-GST paid items when they arrive in Jersey. If your goods are less than the threshold there is no GST. If they are more than the threshold, then you would pay GST. If more than one item arrives for you on the same day, these are added together for the purpose of the de minimis.

INFORMATION ABOUT GST REGISTERED OVERSEAS RETAILERS.

Any overseas retailer, or online market, who sells goods to non-business consumers in Jersey and those goods are despatched from an overseas location to Jersey, must be registered for GST in Jersey if their turnover from such sales exceeds, or is likely to exceed, £300,000 per annum.

Overseas retailers may also opt to register for GST even if they don't reach this threshold in order to benefit from the available Customs easements.

After the Bridging Island Plan came into force last year the Comité Rurale had a short lull in activity, but this year I am anticipating a number of significant planning applications as we have already had meetings with several potential developers seeking feedback, and there are a number of public consultations already in the pipeline.

TREE PROTECTION PROCESS CONSULTATION

The consultation documents were first issued in March. Initial feedback received from gardeners and landowners in the parish along with gardening contractors and tree surgeons all highlighted the many problems with the approach adopted. Indeed, it was felt that the proposals would achieve the very opposite of tree protection and result in fewer trees being planted and a large number felled before the legislation came into force. We are hopeful that following the extended consultation period announced by the Minister and the volume of feedback provided, a more sensible approach will be adopted.

REZONING OF FIELDS FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING

In the Bridging Island Plan a number of fields were rezoned for affordable housing in the parish including J525, the field next to the school where some houses are now nearing completion and new sports facilities for the school will be provided, which already had planning approval. The remaining fields could not proceed until the Planning Department issued specific development briefs on what would be permitted at each site, and this draft guidance was finally issued for consultation in the middle of May.

The other significant sites covered by the proposed guidance are fields J1109 (La Grande Route de St Jean) at Sion, J236 (La Rue du Cimetière), J229 (La Route du Nord next to Maison Le Vesconte) and also field T1404 which although in Trinity is next door to the Co-op store at Sion. The consultation runs up to 23rd of June and the Comité will be considering its response as the draft guidance appears to be problematic.

ST JOHN'S VILLAGE MEMORIAL GARDEN & VILLAGE PARKING, ROAD SAFETY MEASURES

The parish has been developing revised proposals for a Memorial Garden opposite the Parish Hall, general landscaping and also parking opposite the school and around the precinct. The Infrastructure & Environment Department will also be consulting parishioners on potential new road safety measures around the village over the course of the next few months.

SOREL SOLAR FARM

Following an initial open presentation of the proposed solar energy farm held at the Parish Hall in September 2022, we understand that the JEC are due to submit the application for this site in the near future which we will be examining closely.

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The Ministerial Group overseeing the New Healthcare Facilities Programme (NHFP) have endorsed the advice provided by clinical and construction experts on a preferred option for multi-site healthcare delivery in Jersey.

Option B, of the two developed and evaluated, has been selected as the preferred option.



Option A

- · An Acute (Inpatient) facility at Kensington Place
- An Ambulatory (Outpatient) facility at Overdale
- A Health Village at St Saviour (with capacity for rehabilitation and long-term care facilities)

- An Acute (Inpatient) facility at Overdale
- An Ambulatory (Outpatient) facility at Kensington Place
- A Health Village at St Saviour (with capacity for rehabilitation and long-term care facilities)







Why is multi-site healthcare better than a single hospital?

- 1. It provides a plan for healthcare estate development, ensuring those services that were not in the Our Hospital scheme are provided with the future facilities they need. This includes delivery an additional 134 beds across the sites, as well as a range of therapies like hydrotherapy and physiotherapy.
- Building on multiple sites, and having a phased building programme, does not place all the financial or construction risk into one solution and one delivery partner.
- 3. It provides substantial scope for future expansion over the two sites, which could not be achieved in Our Hospital proposals.
- Multi-site construction, as a series of projects delivered in smaller phases, provides increased opportunities for local construction involvement and is more deliverable.
- 5. This solution does not require substantial changes to Westmount Road, the Jersey Bowls Club or Westmount Terrace.
- 6. It separates emergency and outpatient services, dispersing traffic flow, reducing congestion and parking requirements.
- 7. It creates additional public space, especially around the old granite building on Gloucester Street.
- 8. It returns space and sites for other uses, such as Key Worker accommodation.
- It reduces the impact on the natural and built environment, and the physical mass of the facilities, delivering buildings on each site that are better proportioned to their surroundings.
- 10. It provides opportunity for a 'spine' or 'pavilion' Acute Hospital as opposed to 'monoblock' Our Hospital structure, allowing sections to be opened and closed without closing the whole.

Why was Option B selected?


Of the two options evaluated, Option B was favoured for the following reasons:

- Option B scored higher in all evaluation sections than Option A, and significantly higher in the evaluation by clinicians, who rated Option B 'Very Good', while Option A was only 'Adequate'.
- 2. The construction plan for Option B will provide an operational acute hospital by 2028, earlier than Option A by four years.
- 3. It uses both sites to their best potential, optimising the use of Modern Methods of Construction and minimising the delays in construction due to site size and accessibility.
- 4. It minimises the impact of construction vibration and noise on the sickest patients, which could be more significant in Option A.
- 5. It provides the opportunity for better and more efficient clinical adjacencies (where clinical teams are located) due to the larger size of the site.
- Outpatient and day case facilities will remain in town with greatest ease of pedestrian access, public transport, and parking, including access to the Urgent Treatment Centre.
- 7. It will provide peaceful treatment and recovery space for inpatients at Overdale, with increased privacy compared to a town location.
- 8. It provides increased capacity for future expansion on both sites, compared to Option A.

An increase in walking and cycling helps contribute to an uptake in active travel, giving wider health benefits to the people of Jersey. Reducing the speed limit will make our community more accessible to people living in and visiting Jersey.

Please take your time to consider these proposals and give us your views.

Please note that the online consultation covers several Parishes. Only changes relating to this Parish and some roads that cross over into neighbouring Parishes are presented here today.

St John's Village & surrounding areas

A 20mph speed limit is proposed on the following roads:

- La Route du Nord, where the speed limit is currently 30mph
- La Route du Mont Mado, where the speed limit is currently 30mph
- La Route des Issues, where the speed limit is currently 30mph
- La Route de St Jean, east of La Route du Nord, and on the approach to the junction
- La Rue de la Mare Ballam, where the speed limit is currently 30mph
- La Rue de L'Etocquet, east of La Rue du Cimetiere
- Les Clicquards
- Le Pre des Chenes
- Les Tuiles
- Le Clos de L'École
- La Rue du Temple
- La Rue de la Ville Guyon
- Melbourne Park

A 15mph Green Lane is proposed on the following roads:

- Mont Mado Lane
- North View

La Rue de Sorel and Les Charrières

- A 30mph speed limit is proposed on La Rue de Sorel where the speed limit is currently 40mph
- A 20mph speed limit is proposed on Les Charrières de Bonne Nuit where the speed limit is currently 40mph

La Rue des Servais and La Rue des St Germains

- A 20mph speed limit is proposed on la Rue des Servais, where the speed limit is currently 40mph
- A 20mph speed limit is proposed on la Rue des Saints Germains, in the Parish of St Lawrence, where the speed limit is currently 40mph

Please note that the Parish of St Lawrence will be subject to a full review at a later date.

Framework for Speed Limits

We want Jersey's roads to be enjoyed by everyone

Managing the speed of traffic helps other road users feel safer and encourages people to walk and cycle. This is especially important for those travelling to and from school.

Speed limits are set according to a framework that provides consistency across our Island. We are in the process of reviewing all speed limits across the Island against this framework.

Details of the framework are set out below:





The all-Island maximum speed limit is 40mph, or 30mph for vehicles over 3.5T or towing a trailer.



All roads in the urban / built up area should be subject to a 30mph speed limit, with extensions into rural areas where appropriate







Village Centres, typically where people might be walking between a church, a Parish Hall, a shop or a pub, for example, should be 20mph



Framework for Speed Limits



Residential areas that are not "through routes", where pedestrian and cycle movements are likely to be high should be 20mph.



Tourist bays where pedestrian and cycle movements are likely to be high should be 20mph.





Part-time 20mph zones may be signed around schools, at times when children are present

Green Lanes have a 15mph speed limit. Motorised vehicles should give priority to pedestrians, cyclists, and horses at all times



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Please note that where the framework indicates a 40 or 30mph speed limit, a lower speed limit may be applied for road safety reasons.
